I have just two letters from you: one was written on the 22nd and the other was written the 25th. Also received one written on the 18th sometime ago and just to show you how out of order some of the letters arrive I received the one written on the 24th before the one of the 22nd and I receive the one of the 25th before the one of the 24th. In case you've forgotten the one of the 24th was written on Sunday and the one of the 25th is your first numbered one #1. It will be much easier for me to keep them straight if they are numbered.

I've been to London again and had a dull time except for a few shows "Winter time", "Holy matrimony" and "The Sky is the Limit".

I received your films the other day and I want to thank you so much

for them my Sweet. I'm going to try
to get some pictures of the crew. It will
take me a long time to get them developed
and passed by the censors but I will
have them eventually.

I have a terrible cold just
now: been coughing my head off the
past two days. I sure hope to start taking
medicine but I guess I'll have to.

By the way, Honey you let
me down as far as the comments on the
2nd Parade go. I always like to know what
top on the 6th parade. I finally heard
Nevada and I agree with you it is
good. The English have been dying to
hear Pottle Pochin. Mama but as yet it
hasn't been published over here.

Pappa Al gave me a swell
tobacco pouch for X-Mas: it is one of
those kind that you can carry your pipe
in too. It is made of very good leather.
I've laid off the pipe till I get this cold
cleared up. This is #4 of my letters to
you. I had a little trouble remember-

ing how many letters I had written, but
now I have a better system. I just number
the envelopes in the box and take them
out as I need em. I won't number the
A-mail they will just be extra.

Mich is ~~still~~ still doing fine.
I just came from his barracks. We have
our little talks quite often.

I think that I had better
wait until I get back before I give you the
English for my French. And I might add
that I hope that that time is not far off.
There are quite a few things that I should
like to say and in English too.

I haven't heard from Shirley
in quite sometime now and Ben is as
quiet as usual. I guess Shirley is about
ready to ship out. I'd give the world
to see him here in England. It has
been 18 months or more since I've
had a talk with de Lard. We have
been in touch constantly by mail, how-
ever.

Give my regards to your folks
and thank Nancy Ann for the film.
